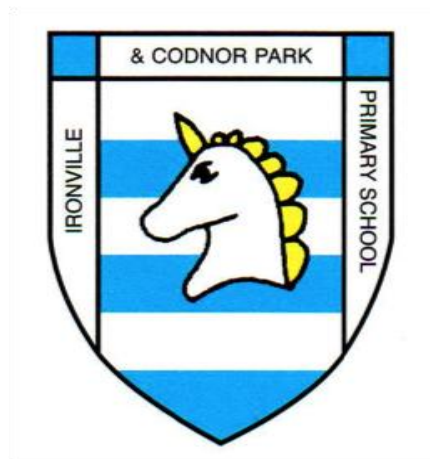

We are an open and friendly school and we value your contribution, whether it takes the form of attending parents' evenings and school events, helping in school, or sharing any concerns or worries you may have with us.

Frequently asked questions (FAQs)

What are the times of the school day?

Children are not allowed on the site until 8:40 a.m. At the start of the day, children have a 'Meet and Greet' at the school gate and by the class teacher entering school. Wrens line up and are met by staff to enter school when the bell is rung at 8:45 a.m. In the Summer term, they walk straight into school with a 'Meet and Greet' at the door. Children are registered for two sessions during the day, once at 8.45a.m and once at 1.00p.m in the afternoon.

What does my child need to wear to school?

Good standards of dress create the right attitude to work and to encourage this we recommend the following uniform:

School Uniform (Monday, Wednesday and Thursday)

- blue school sweatshirt / fleece / cardigan with or without school logo
- white or plain blue shirt, blouse or polo shirt.
- a grey or black skirt or pinafore dress.
- grey or black trousers or shorts. Shorts are only permitted after Easter and until October half term.
- gingham blue/white summer dresses are only permitted after Easter and until October half term.
- black, navy, grey or white socks/tights.
- plain black shoes or boots with low heels (no more than 2cms/1 inch in height). This includes **plain** black trainers as we want to encourage children to be running around and keeping fit at break and lunch time. Please ensure the trainers have plain black soles and no coloured logos. No other trainers will be accepted as uniform. **Please note that crocs (or croc style), sling back shoes or open-toed are not permitted.**
- Coats must be worn during break times and lunchtimes in cold/wet weather.

For P.E. and games (Tuesday and Friday) your child will need:

Indoor kit

- White/pale blue T- shirt with or without the school logo.
- plain black/navy shorts.
- flat trainers (these can be any colour)/black plimsolls.

Outdoor kit. As above but if it is cold can include:

- plain black/navy jogging bottoms or plain black/navy exercise leggings. No logos/brands.
- plain black/navy sweat shirt or school sweatshirt
- flat trainers (these can be any colour).

For swimming (in KS2)

- costume
- towel
- waterproof bag

Please remember to name all items! Children should not wear jewellery for safety reasons. Children come dressed for PE on a Tuesday and a Friday.

How do I report my child's absence?

Please call the school on each day of absence stating the reason why your child is absent. For reasons of child safety we would ask that you telephone the school before 8:45 a.m. to report any absence from school. If no reason for absence is provided by 9:00 a.m. School will telephone you to request the reason for absence. If we are unsuccessful in contacting you by 9:30 a.m. we will telephone your child's emergency contacts. If no response by 10:00 a.m. School staff will visit you at home.

Regular and punctual attendance at school is a legal requirement and a responsibility shared by parents /carers and the school. We have a Family Support Worker at the school who is available to discuss any issues or problems you may have regarding attendance or punctuality.

How does the school promote behaviour?

We believe that children and staff can only give their best in an ordered atmosphere based on mutual respect and trust. We aim to create this atmosphere by actively looking for and rewarding good behaviour. We do, however, have a range of sanctions which we reserve the right to use if children do not respond to praise and encouragement. A copy of the school's Behaviour Policy is available on the school website or at the school office.



What happens if my child needs to leave school for a medical appointment?

If your child has an unavoidable medical appointment which means that they have to leave school during the school day, or if they need to leave school before home time for any other reasons such as illness, please can we ask that you collect your child in person from school. If a medical appointment is during the day then please do not take the whole day off from school – this missed learning time cannot be replaced. Parents/carers should show the appointment card, text message or prescription to school otherwise the appointment will not be authorised.

What do I do if my child is ill or hurts themselves?

If children are unwell the class teacher will make the decision to contact you.

If a child hurts themselves during the school day the staff in school will administer minor first aid. A letter to inform you will be sent home with your child in the event of any head injury. In some cases, the school will contact you and ask you to come into school to consider whether your child needs further treatment.

What do I do if my child has an allergy or has a medical condition?

It is important that you notify the school if your child has an allergy or a medical condition. Please provide the school admin with the medical advice from the health practitioner or their contact details as it may be necessary to write an Individual Health Plan to support your child in school. Inhalers are kept in classrooms. All other medicines will be kept in the School Office. Records will be kept of first aid given. Please note that teachers cannot take responsibility for administering medication and no medication will be administered without signed written instructions from parents / carers. Please see Mrs Moore for a form.

What happens if my child has headlice?

Please report any cases to the class teacher and ensure that treatment is followed as soon as possible. If a new case is spotted in school we will inform parents/carers.

Can I take my child on holiday during school time?

Please see the school's attendance policy on the school website.

How much homework will my child receive?

Each term, if your child is in Year One to Year Five they will receive a Homework booklet which encourages creativity and family time. Year Six are given books and focus on core skills. We expect all children to spend a short time each evening completing homework, reading or practising their spellings/mental maths ideally with a older family member. We greatly value the commitment of parents/carers/grandparents in helping children with these activities as this strengthens the link between home and school, as well as providing children with the support they need while they are learning.

Can I come and visit the school?

Parents/carers are always welcome. We are an open and friendly school and we try to work in partnership with you for the benefit of all our children. If you need to see the headteacher however, please telephone first to make an appointment.

If you have any worries about your child please come and tell us so that we can do our best to arrive at a solution together.

Is there a breakfast club available?

Currently the school does not have a breakfast club.

Are there after school clubs available?

The school offers a wide range of extra-curricular activities to enhance learning which take place after school. At the start of every term a letter goes out listing the clubs which are available and a containing a form to book a place. It is essential that every term a new form is completed for each club.

What do I do if I have changed my phone number or address?

It is paramount that the school holds accurate up to date contact and medical information for all our children. We ask for two emergency contacts. If you have any change of address, telephone numbers or emergency contacts please contact the school office.

How do I find out how my child is getting on at school?

The school holds Parents' Evenings towards the end of the autumn and spring term each year. Interim reports are sent home at the end of October and February half term. At the end of the summer term a full written report is sent home and you can request an appointment to discuss the report with your child's teacher if you wish – or we may invite you to a meeting if there is something we wish to discuss with you. If you require more information about your child's progress, class teachers are available before and after school each day. Please ask for an appointment.

At the beginning of each school year we also hold a 'Welcome' session where we invite you to meet your child's new class teacher, have a chat and ask any questions you have about the next academic year.

Will I get the opportunity to see what is happening in my child's class?

At Ironville and Codnor Park Primary School we are proud of the way that we work with our parents and carers and the contribution they make to their child's education. During the school year we run a variety of workshops in early reading, maths and English. We have many opportunities for families to engage in activities such as Christmas and Easter Craft days, special assemblies and Lunch and Stays during 'Wonderful World Week', when we encourage you to come and eat with your child and then stay for part of their afternoon lesson.

How does the school keep me informed?

We send home a weekly newsletter via email and this is then uploaded onto the school website. We also have a text messaging service.

What can my child eat at break times?

All children in EYFS and Key Stage One (Reception, Year One and Year Two) benefit from the national initiative to provide children with a free piece of fruit or vegetable each day.

Children in KS2 (Years Three, Four, Five and Six) may bring in a healthy snack to eat at break time.



Does my child get any drinks while in school?

Fresh drinking water is available in every classroom throughout the day and in the dining hall at lunchtime. During the summer months and in hot weather fresh drinking water is also available during lunchtime on the school playground.

We ask that all children bring in a named drinks container with fresh water in.

What happens if I think the school might be closed because of bad weather?

In the event of extreme weather conditions, we will endeavour to keep school open, but if the weather deteriorates we may have to close in the interests of everyone's health and safety. At this point we would use our texting service to inform you all of the need to close the school and to ask you to collect your child as soon as possible.

If the school remains closed or is unable to open because of extreme weather overnight, our procedure for informing you remains the same. A text message will be sent as soon as possible in the morning and the school website will be updated. A message will also appear on the Derbyshire County Council Website www.derbyshire.gov.uk/schoolclosures.

What happens in hot weather?

Staff are not allowed to apply sun protection cream to children but they will willingly supervise pupils in applying their own lotion, brought in a named container. Sun hats are also recommended during hot weather. We closely follow the government guidance in hot weather. Adjustments will be made to the curriculum and uniform when necessary. In the event of a

yellow heat alert jumpers and cardigans are not required to be worn and in the event of an amber weather alert PE kits are allowed alongside summer uniform.

Where should I park?

The vehicle entrance is only to be used by parents/carers to exit the school grounds and children to exit at the end of the day, to prevent overcrowding on the pavement. Please do not park on the zigzags outside the school. Restrictions apply from **Monday to Friday**, between **8:00 a.m and 9:30 a.m** and **2:30p.m and 4:00 p.m**. We ask you to park away from the school with consideration for our neighbours, pedestrians, other motorists and the safety of our children.

Will my child go on a school trip?

Educational visits are organised to support topics being studied. These are partly paid for by voluntary parental contributions and it is important to note that these visits cannot take place if costs cannot be met. The parent and teacher association also fund raise to help subsidise the cost of these visits. Parents / carers will give permission for their child to conduct local visits on entry to school. If you do not wish for this to continue throughout their time in school, you must contact school and this will be noted.



What do I do if my child loses something?

Please make sure all uniform (and coats/bags) are named. Staff will be more than happy look for lost items at the end of the school day. At the end of each half term, lost property is displayed outside. We regularly recycle uniform if it is unnamed which can be purchased, for a small donation, alongside the table top shop.

Can I take photographs of my child at school events?

We recognise that parents, carers and family members may wish to record events such as school plays, sports days etc to celebrate their child's achievements. However, due to safeguarding reasons, we do not allow this.

Any objections to this policy should be addressed to the Headteacher.

Can I volunteer in school?

We are always pleased to receive offers of help in school — let us know if you have any skills or hobbies which you feel you can share with us. If you would like to help, please come and speak to the Headteacher. Before you start you will have a short induction, which will involve training on safeguarding children, and you will be given a variety of documents. This includes advice on conduct, confidentiality when working within a school, safe use of mobile phones and guidance on personal / professional boundaries in emailing, messaging, and participating in social

networking environments. Due to safeguarding restrictions, we will ask you if you volunteer anywhere else and will ask you to complete an enhanced DBS check if you wish to volunteer on a regular basis.

We welcome visitors who would like to share their careers or have a keen interest in sharing their knowledge, understanding and experience of any learning children are exploring.

Complaints

We welcome comments and views about our school and encourage contact with all parents/carers. The school sends out a questionnaire twice a year to gather information about your views and opinions and you also may wish to speak to a parent governor who will be more than happy to talk to you.

If you have a complaint regarding the school there should be a preliminary informal discussion with the Headteacher or other appropriate staff to see if this can be resolved without recourse to formal procedures. If the complaint cannot be resolved informally it will be dealt with through the School Complaints Procedures. Paper copies are available from the School Office.

Data Protection

Basic information about your child is held on a secure server to assist with the efficient organisation of the school and the individual's educational needs. More detailed information is given to parents on registration. All information is covered by the Data Protection Act. Please refer to the SHINE Multi-Academy Trust for further information.

Equal Opportunities

The school takes positive action to provide equal opportunities for all regardless of gender, race or creed, and the school has a policy for ensuring equality of opportunity and inclusion in line with local authority and national guideline.

Home-School Agreement Packages
